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The minister provides a convincing clarification that flooding is sufficiently covered in the legislation surrounding fire and rescue services, and as such there is a statutory duty for fire and rescue services to attend flooding. I am pleased that he also acknowledges the excellent work that fire and rescue services have done during the recent flooding.

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Thank you for your letter of 21 February regarding your constituent's concern on the issue of introducing a statutory duty for fire and rescue services to attend flooding events.

Both the Civil Contingencies Act 2004 and the Fire and Rescue Services Act 2004 detail the roles and powers of fire and rescue authorities in respect of both emergency response and rescue in a wide range of situations, including from flooding. Fire and rescue authorities are required to identify and assess the full range of risks that an authority's service is expected to face, including flooding where appropriate. The analysis informs each authority's decision on the appropriate allocation of resources to deliver its prevention, protection and emergency response activities, which is taken after effective consultation with the local community. These expectations are clearly set out in the statutory National Fire Framework published in July 2012.

Over the past few months the fire and rescue services have provided an excellent response to flooding without the need for a statutory duty.
